This is going to be an easy week as we spend the time learning letters of the alphabet.

Lesson 1: The letter delta

- It is a consonant.
- It is pronounced like "d."

Greek	delta
δ	small
Δ	capital

Lesson 2: The letter zeta

- It is a consonant.
- It is pronounced like "z."

Greek	zeta
ζ	small
Z	capital

• Note: the small letter has a "tail" that goes below the line.

Lesson 3: The letter lambda

- It is a consonant.
- It is pronounced like "l."

Greek	lambda
λ	small
Λ	capital

<u>Lesson 4</u>: The letter mu

- It is a consonant.
- It is pronounced like "m."

Greek	mu
μ	small
M	capital

• Note: the small letter has "tail" on the front end that goes below the line.

<u>Lesson 5</u>: The letter nu

• It is a consonant.

It is pronounced like "n."

Greek	nu
ν	small
N	capital

Lesson 6: The letter xi

• It is a consonant.

• It is pronounced like an "x."

xi
small
capital

• Note: the small letter has a "tail" which goes below the line.

- 5. Definite article
 - O This is the masculine definite article and will be in front of masculine nouns.
 - $\dot{\eta}$ This is the feminine definite article and will be in front of feminine nouns.
 - $\tau \acute{0}$ This is the neuter definite article and will be in front of neuter nouns.
- 6. "A"
 - Greek does not have a word for "a"
